When we come to place our faith in Christ, we too find the treasure of a lifetime. Suddenly, our lives are changed. Yet we often treat it like a pile of rusty antiques. An interesting find, a momentary lift and then off it goes to a musty basement in a museum. Like an ancient treasure map, the Bible shows us where to find the true riches we have received through salvation in Christ.

#### Buried Treasure

Mel Fisher dedicated the prime of his life to finding the sunken treasure of the Atocha, which went down in 1622. For 20 years, he searched and dreamed. He battled bill collectors, the Supreme Court, and the doubt of everyone. The lowest point came when his son, fellow treasure hunter Dirk, was killed looking for the wreck. But in 1985, Fisher found the mother lode: \$450 million in ancient gold, silver, and precious gems, 47 troy tons of treasure in all.

#### I. MADE THAT WAY

It seemed like a good idea at the time. Farmers wanted to sell tobacco. And smokers seemed to get pleasure from lighting up cigarettes. Many claimed to experience health benefits like sharper mental acuity and natural weight loss. One ad touted, "Each puff is as cool and refreshing as a frosty drink after a dusty 20-mile hike." That's how tobacco became a multi-billion dollar industry.

But as it turns out, the human body doesn't exactly thrive under constant exposure to smoke. In fact, it's deadly. Instead, our bodies benefit from things like that 20-mile hike. It's how we're made.

Physically, we need fresh air. And spiritually, we were made to thrive when connected to God's Spirit. Other approaches may seem good at the time. But they can sometimes do more harm than good. Salvation is God's act of saving us from choices that once seemed like a good idea, but have resulted in our spiritual destruction.

#### III. GAINING ETERNAL LIFE

#### Receiving the Gift

We were made to need God. And he initiated the connection. So what now? How do we resolve the tension we feel apart from him? What is required to "sign on" with him once and for all? Many religious approaches seem to emphasize a variety of tasks that need to be accomplished in order to fully qualify or to justify our worthiness with God. But Jesus' closest followers emphasized the simplicity and availability of connecting with Christ. They describe it more like an undeserving person opening an unexpected gift.

#### IV. Believe, Confess, and Repent


- > Pisteuo to believe; to be convinced of a matter; to place confidence in a belief to the point of relying on it.
- > Homologeo to confess; to agree with; to concede; to declare or profess openly.
- > Metanoia to repent; to change one's mind; to retract a previous statement and replace it with a new one.



V. I'm So Sure
For some people, connecting with Christ can be an emotional experience. For others, it's more of a logical practical step in life. It all depends on your personality. In either case, the experience is valid and real. As a unique creation of God, you are entitled to your own, unique response to His presence in your life.
To become a Christian is to accept an invitation. Whether we laugh or cry or feel a quiet joy when we grasp that invitation, God causes a profound change in our eternal destiny. Our emotions are merely the icing not the cake. God's work in our lives, based on our assent to His plan, is the substance.
It's normal for Christians to have questions about their salvation. How can we know for sure about eternity? John, who knew Jesus, tells us the facts.
Read I John 5:11-13. In verses 11-12, what evidence do we have of Eternal Life?
According to John 10:25-30, who has the power to give eternal life, and where does eternal life come from?



#### Here Today, God's Tomorrow

#### Scripture Memory Verse

#### I John 5:11-13

"And this is the testimony: God has given us eternal life, and this life is in his Son. He who has the Son has life; he who does not have the Son of God does not have life. I write these things to you who believe in the name of the Son of God so that you may know that you have eternal life."

#### Why Memorize and Meditate on Scripture?

When Jesus was tempted by Satan in the wilderness (Matthew 4:1-11), three times Jesus replied: "It is written." Jesus then quoted particular and pertinent Scripture from the Old Testament to combat Satan's attack. In this passage we see that Satan quotes Scripture in a distorted way to tempt Jesus. Jesus used the appropriate Scripture to refute Satan and show his error. Matthew 4:11 states that Satan then left Christ.

If Christ found the Scriptures necessary to battle Satan, how much more do we need this weapon, the Word of God, for our lives? This week you will start hiding God's Word in your heart. Psalms 119:11 says "I have hidden your word in my heart that I might not sin against you." God's Word strengthens and encourages us in the daily battles of life. In addition, it serves as a preventative measure to keep you from sinning against God. Key verses have been chosen to help you grow in your spiritual walk with the Lord. Work diligently to learn them. You are joining thousands of others who have found this the key to their spiritual growth.

# How To Memorize Scripture Effectively Tear out the card in the back of this book on which

Tear out the card in the back of this book on which I John 5:11-13 is printed. You may choose to memorize either the NIV (New International Version) or the NASB (New American Standard Bible). Read it several times, silently and aloud, to get an overall view of the content. Then, begin memorizing the verses, one phrase at a time. Each time you say the verse or a part of the verse, begin by repeating the reference: "I John 5:11-13." Also, say the reference after each time you repeat the verse or part of the verse. How many times have you heard or said, "There's a verse somewhere that says..."? Repeating the reference every time fixes its location in your memory.

God urges his people many times throughout Scripture to meditate on His Word and promises to bless them as a result. Once you have memorized the whole passage, begin to meditate on the verse. One way to do this is to repeat the verse, emphasizing a different word each time. Personalizing the verse often brings added insight and help: substitute personal pronouns into the verse, "me," "I," or your name. For instance I John 5:11-13, personalized, would be:

"And this is the testimony: God has given me, \_\_\_\_\_\_, eternal life, and this life is in his Son. If I have the Son I have life; if I do not have the Son of God I do not have life. These things were written to me, \_\_\_\_\_, who believes in the name of the Son of God so that I may know that I have eternal life."

Caution: Make sure you know the verse word for word as it is written before you try to personalize it or else you might get confused!

Review is the key to mastering and retaining these verses. So, every day, review I John 5:11-13. Next week, when you begin another verse, keep reviewing I John 5:11-13 daily while you are working on the new verse. The cards are small so they are conveniently portable or they can be taped on your mirror for frequent review! As you encounter various situations and temptations during the week, you will be surprised to see how often God will bring these verses to mind to strengthen and sustain you.

The intent of this memory work is not that of duty or performance but that of growing deeper with the Lord and deeper in your relationship with your "Paul" as you work on these verses together.



It's a daunting task that sends most of us to the philosophy textbooks or the deep recesses of our own thoughts. Who am I? is a question that gives birth to other questions: What measures identity? Success? Appearance? Personal history? Background? Who says who I am? Do I get to define myself? In our complicated, educated culture, the idea of "self" can seem like a hazy thought at best, or, at worst, a hopeless conundrum.

Not so in every culture. In many tribal villages in Papua New Guinea, people and items are



identified by one factor alone: ownership. And ownership is determined by creation. In other words, if you made a paddle, that paddle is yours. More than its function or appearance, the paddle's primary definition is: yours. That's why many Christians in these villages refer to God as "Papa/Owner." As Creator, God is the owner of all and, thereby, the ultimate definition of all.

If I am defined by the One who made me and owns me, it makes sense to look back to Him for clues about who I am. It is much more important to know who God says I am than for me to define who I am. Knowing who we are before attempting to live life by doing something is essential to being fulfilled, being at peace with yourself and living in harmony with others. In other words it is "Who before Do." We will look at:

- I. Who am I in God's eyes?
- II. What does this mean to me?
- III. How do I live this way?
- IV. Power for living


## I. Who Am I in God's Eyes?

When we come into this personal relationship with God through trusting in who Christ is and what He has done for us, we move from the family of Adam to the family of God. We are adopted into this family. What is significant about being an adopted child rather than a "natural" child who is born into his family? Adoption is a relationship of choice. In our case, God's choice. We are not an "accident" or, worse, unwanted. When God says we are adopted into His family, that means we have gained a new identity, a new heritage and a new future. Our new identity is what we receive at the moment of salvation-new creation, new family and new heritage. Our old nature has died and we now have a new nature (our position). As we grow, we begin to experience Christ living through us—this is known as Christ's indwelling life (our condition). Both are true and foundational to living the Christian life. #### II. WHAT DOES THIS MEAN TO ME?

#### Consider the Following:

"I cannot overly stress how critical it is to believe that God wishes all Christians would understand and appropriate their true identity in Christ. God wishes you, as a follower of Christ, would understand that your new identity is more than His having erased your name from the debit side of His ledger and moved it into the asset column. It is not a mere paper transaction. In order for God to write your name in the Lamb's book of life, a miraculous transformation must happen whereby you are instantly, radically changed:



The quality of your life is linked to how well you understand your identity.



- > From a child of Satan to a child of God
- > From not being accepted by God to be being fully accepted by God
- > From being guilty to being forgiven
- > From being condemned to receiving a full pardon
- > From being a glitch in God's vision, to being the apple of His eye
- > From being totally unlovely to being lovely and loveable
- > From being a commoner to being royalty
- > From focusing on being a sinner to focusing on being a saint



"All of this and much more become your permanent identity when you became spiritually reborn in Christ. He accomplished this all for you. Now He longs to reap the personal benefit from such a sacrifice by having a warm, intimate relationship with you." Bill Gillham, speaker and author



#### Summary

Christ's love and acceptance gives me security, significance and satisfaction.

- > My worth and significance are found solely in Christ (which is forever and unchanging) and not in performance or in a position.
- > Because of my worth in Christ, I am free from the opinions of others, though I can listen and learn from them.
- > In this freedom from opinions, I can truly serve and love others (value and honor people).
- > Because of my security in Christ, I can be process-focused vs. results-oriented or bottom-line-driven.
- > Because of this freedom I possess, I can give away power or empower others, boldly and confidently.
- > "In Christ" I am free from the bondage to sin. That means I am free from one of the chief sins: pride. I need not "think more highly of myself than I ought."
- > His love and acceptance give me a security which helps me examine and purify my motives.



#### III. How Do I LIVE THIS WAY?

To know the truth about my identity is one thing, but how do I move the truth from my head to my heart and to my feet?

- > Through this indwelling, I can experience moment by moment victory (rest, peace) which comes from Him. *Ephesians 2:14-16*
- > It provides and clarifies my true hope especially in trial and difficulty. Colossians 1:27-29
- > It is only Christ's resources that can defeat the true enemy—Satan. IJohn 4:4
- > It is an ongoing and growing process. *Ephesians 4:13*

#### Wired for Battle

War is hell. That sentiment perhaps most accurately reflects the mood of our nation ever since the Vietnam War. Many agree this was a conflict without clear objectives or motives. General Maxwell Taylor, one of the principal architects of the war, called the Vietnam War "dirty business." No arguments there.



#### Dirty Business

Is this what spiritual warfare is? Do we embrace the amazing grace of God, enter into His eternal kingdom, become a member of a heavenly family, only to enlist the very next moment in the dirty business of war? Are we required to put our heads down and press on into the mud and muck of battle like a conscripted foot soldier who longs for home? Is that our message to the world? Do we hear: "Accept God's bountiful love for you right where you are, but as soon as you do you'd better strap on your armor if you want to be good!"?

Or could it be that, like everything else in our lives, God's plan is to *redeem* the very idea of war? Just as He redeems broken things like relationships and work, might He be "buying back" the world's idea of conflict? If this is so, then the Christian's war might be an adventure rather than an obligation. If war is inevitable but redeemable, what does it look like from God's perspective?

#### An Epic Battle

Little boys often dream of war. Even in homes where toy guns are forbidden, young boys will fashion just about any household item into a weapon. Clearly, little boys retain some of this mentality well into adulthood. Why else do war movies remain a wildly popular genre? Every culture in every time has an epic tale of combat in its history, whether legend or fact.

There is a noble place in our hearts that longs for battle. Could it be that God has put it there? That the battle is, indeed, a noble one because we are meant to fight it and we were made to win?

#### Strategy

In looking back on the Vietnam War, General Taylor observed "first, we didn't know ourselves... And we knew less about As followers of Christ, we are engaged in a cosmic conflict, whether we know it or not. Scripture clearly teaches and illustrates the dynamics of this warfare on the three battle fronts of the world, the flesh, and the devil. The worldly and demonic systems are external to believers, but they entice and provide opportunities for the flesh, which is the capacity for sin within us.



#### Spiritual Warfare: What Is It?

Spiritual warfare exists in the unseen, supernatural dimension, where God is all-powerful and Satan is in revolt. As any Christian soon discovers, although spiritual warfare is unseen, it's absolutely real. The Bible speaks of spiritual warfare in many places, but most directly in Ephesians 6:12. "For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places."

#### Spiritual Warfare: Dress Code for a Soldier

In the 1850s the rifle replaced the musket. And then several years later smokeless powder was invented. Suddenly, visibility on the battlefield drastically improved. The color of uniforms became an issue of life or death. For obvious reasons, by the 1990s British infantrymen no longer wore their famous scarlet coats into combat. As Christians, what we wear into battle is just as important. Spiritual struggle requires specific pieces of arms and armor. Ephesians 6:13-18 offers a detailed description for the Christian's uniform and weaponry for combat:

"Therefore put on the full armor of God, so that when the day of evil comes, you may be able to stand your ground, and after you have done everything, to stand. Stand firm then, with the belt of truth buckled around your waist, with the breastplate of righteousness in place, and with your feet fitted with the readiness that comes from the gospel of peace. In addition to all this, take up the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish all the flaming arrows of the evil one. Take the helmet of salvation and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God. And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the saints." *Ephesians 6:13-18* 

# What is this Spiritual Armor? How does it apply to us?

#### Spiritual Warfare: Be Strong in the Lord

Spiritual warfare is a reality of the Christian life. But remember, we know the outcome already—our side wins the overall war. Since the Devil has already lost, we can expect him to act with dangerous desperation, seeking to inflict as much damage as possible as he goes down.

"Finally, be strong in the Lord and in his mighty power. Put on the full armor of God so that you can take your stand against the devil's schemes." *Ephesians 6:10-11*

# II. WHAT IS BATTLE WITH THE WORLD?

In this battle, there are several enemies. Each one tries to entice you to place value on something other than what is truly important. The first of these enemies is the world. Of course, the planet itself is not your enemy; but there are many things in the world that can lure your heart away from Christ. For this reason, we refer



to them as "the world."

The state motto of North Carolina is *esse quam videri*, "to be rather than to seem." That phrase could be woven into a flag as the motto of every individual Christian as well. We aren't called to seem like anything. We're called to be who we truly are. The problem is, we live and work and eat and play in a world that is all about seeming. The world has it turned completely inside out: the unimportant is what matters in the world's value system.

In Psalm 90:1, Moses prayed, "Lord, through all the generations You have been our home!" (New Living Translation) This is from a man who wandered in the desert for forty years. But his words speak for every believer today: our true home is not the address listed on our mortgage. Like Moses, we're nomads. So when we speak of the gravitational pull of the world's temporal values and goals, we would do well to remember that the real world is another place altogether. And God's Word is a travel brochure to that real, substantial destination.

#### You Can't Get There from Here

When we are in bondage to "the elementary principles of the world" (Colossians 2:8), we cannot experience the freedom and joy that is waiting for us in our real "home" in Christ. When we buy into the world's standards of wealth and prestige and position, we are subtly drawn away from the eternal value system revealed in Scripture. Worldliness isn't just about what we drink and eat and watch; it is an inner magnetism that lures us to conform to standards other than God's. It is a powerful force which has programmed much of our thinking from the moment of birth.

But just as our battle against the devil is already won, this battle—the battle to live "above" what is seen—is a done deal. We already live there. We just need to open our eyes and look around.

### III. WHAT IS THE BATTLE WITH THE FLESH?

Perhaps you read about who you are in Christ in the previous chapter and thought, "But that's not my experience. I don't look like that!" If you feel that disconnect between truth and experience, you're not alone. As you read the next passages, you'll discover that there's more to come! We are still waiting for the fullness of our redemption (Romans 8:23). Until that time, the old appetites, attitudes, memories, and habits can surface at any time and wage war against the life of Christ in us.

If our battle against our flesh were merely outward in nature, the world's monasteries would be full. We'd still be wearing hair shirts and practicing self-flagellation. But the reason these extremes aren't necessary isn't because the battle is inner rather than outer. It's because of who we are and whose we are. Philippians 2:13 promises: "For God is working in you, giving you the desire to obey him and the power to do what pleases him." The desire you need to defeat the flesh is already inside you. This is one of the ways God has redeemed the concept of war for Christians. He has caused us to yearn for the fight.

"S.O.S. I need your help. I am injured, near death, and too weak to hike out of here. I am all alone, this is no joke. In the name of God, please remain to save me. I am out collecting berries close by and shall return this evening. Thank you, Chris McCandless. August"

Christopher McCandless graduated from Emory University in 1990, gave his entire savings to charity, and began a two-year trek across the country as "Alex Supertramp." When his desperate note was discovered by two hikers on the door of an abandoned bus near Denali National Park in Alaska, he wasn't out foraging for berries, he was inside in his sleeping bag.



He had been dead of starvation for at least two weeks.

McCandless believed he could rely on his meager supplies and his severely limited education and experience to survive in the wild. By the time he made a choice to cry out for help, it was too late.

That's what temptation can do. We can be right at the edge of a breathtakingly beautiful piece of real estate and totally miss it! The Christian life isn't a walk down a garden path—but it isn't a trudge in the mud either. It's often a hike on a difficult trail. But the view from the trail is stupendous! You wouldn't want to miss it for the world. Could it be temptation is more than just a lure toward bad habits and moral failings? Could it be the choice temptation presents to us isn't even an enticement to actually leave the trail (although sometimes it may be)?

Christopher McCandless' journey into the wilds of Alaska missed the mark of his original dream, not because he caved in and gave up. He missed fulfillment of his purpose simply because he waited too late to acknowledge his own helplessness.

# II. How Can I FIND THE PATH AGAIN?

#### Call It Like It Is

There's a reason men are universally known for refusing to ask for directions! At some point we have to get back on the right road. One of life's toughest assignments is admitting when we're wrong—or that we're lost. When we sin we have a choice: confess and receive forgiveness, or disagree with God and face the consequences of guilt and broken relationships. Things we were made to avoid.

"Confession" makes us think of the desperation of a death row inmate or the quiet seclusion of a shadowed confessional booth. We've all heard the phrase "confession is good for the soul." But what does that mean? Let's find out what Scripture says about it.

### III. How Do I STAY ON THE PATH?

God will not leave us in the woods. He promises to help us find our way out. It's one thing to speak of obeying one's parents, or a supervisor, or the authorities. We can see and hear them. But how, exactly, do we obey God? How can we know we're on the "straight and narrow" path? Look at II Timothy 3:16.

#### 3. Correcting


(How to change) Shows you how to get back on the path.

# IV. THE FRUITS OF OBEDIENCE

If only obedience came naturally! Anyone who has ever been a parent (or a child) knows that it doesn't. Children are born with an inclination to rebel. It has been this way since Adam and Eve failed their first test. At some point, in so many words, kids ask the question: "Why obey my parents?" Whether we're comfortable admitting it or not, Christians eventually need to ask a similar question. We need to understand the why, as well as the what, of obedience.

In the Old Testament, King David was tempted and he fell into a wrong relationship with another man's wife, Bathsheba, with grievous consequences. When confronted with this, he acknowledged the wrong and repented.

#### Displacement

Our brains are powerful instruments, that's why the medical definition of death is "no brain activity." The human brain contains more than 100 billion neurons, each linked to as many as 10,000 other neurons. Although we're capable of multi-tasking, or parallel thought processes, our powerful brains still function best when we focus. We take supplements and go to seminars to learn the art of focusing. That's because what we think about either limits or expands what we're able to do. From the first day of kindergarten, we experience the necessity of focus. By middle school, we've learned that the grades on our report cards are linked to our ability to focus. According to the commercials, any bad habit from overeating to smoking can be conquered with enough of this desirable brain function. If it's that simple, how do we do it?

Try this simple exercise: Think about the number four. Take a few seconds to focus on four. Got that cemented in your mind? Okay, now stop thinking about four. Get rid of that four! It's hard to do, isn't it? Finally, take a moment to think about the number six. Six. Zone in on six. If your brain functions like most people's, you are now thinking of six instead of four. You've demonstrated the handy skill of displacement.

Philippians 4:8 says this, "Finally, brothers, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things."

Paul's admonition is to fill your mind so full of what is true and good, sinful thoughts are displaced. Temptation will come, but it's hard for the devil to deceive you when your mind is focused on excellent things. Satan can only work with what you give him, so don't give him any opportunity to work on your mind.

This isn't just passive mental manipulation. It's capitalizing on the way God made your mind. Here are a couple of basic exercises (so basic, it's almost embarrassing) that demonstrate our ability to "renew" our thinking. For two weeks, make a list every morning of ten things you're thankful for. At the end of the two weeks, look back and observe any overall changes in your attitudes in general.

Here's another: When you are tempted in a certain area, use the moment to pray for a friend who you know struggles with similar temptations. It is amazing how the temptations ease up when you shift your focus to someone else's need.

#### Follow the Leader

Obedience isn't the result of sheer willpower. For someone who has experienced the grace of God, it is an ongoing, profound "thank you" note to the Giver of that grace. It is grateful communication that ultimately leads to intimacy with the one we're thankful to. Not only that, obedience to God is the only sane way to live in the world He created. Every other path leads to self-destruction. As you travel, always keep in mind Paul's words:

"Never be lacking in zeal, but keep your spiritual fervor, serving the Lord. Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer." *Romans 12:11-12* 

"I NEED HELP! The words screamed at my mind as I hurried out of a Reno, Nevada casino. Since arriving I had denied that I had a gambling problem. I was a Christian, an active member of my church, but I had a problem I wasn't aware of. Everyone else knew. They knew why I quit my job-training program to commit myself to the outpatient program at the state hospital. They knew why I was over my head in debt. They knew I wrote bad checks to casinos. Everyone knew, but me." *Member of Gamblers Anonymous* 

Perhaps the most poignant and powerful prayer of all is the "I need help" prayer. When we say these words to God we acknowledge two things: our desperate need for Him and His power to come to the rescue! Colossians 2:6 says, "As you have received Christ Jesus, so walk in Him." What did your first prayer to Him sound like? How is that first experience of crying out to God similar to your daily walk with Him now?

#### What's in a Name?

God's name is so familiar in our culture that many make use of it in daily conversation. The problem is, they summon God by name most vehemently when they swear. When your neighbor bangs his thumb with a hammer in his garage, he might just invoke God's name loudly enough for you to hear it in your living room. The same goes for Jesus. If your buddy laments a fumble during Monday Night Football, Jesus may be mentioned. But even those who use salty language probably don't call upon the Holy Spirit with the same ease.

Whether they know Him or not, most people are comfortable using God's name in conversation. But not the Holy Spirit. He's the neglected Person of the Trinity. Even His name is mysterious. The King James version of the Bible refers to Him as The Holy Ghost. Talk about spooky! For many believers, His work is equally obscure. Who is He? What does He mean to your life? The Bible has plenty to tell us about the Holy Spirit.

# I. WHO IS THE HOLY SPIRIT?

#### The Holy Spirit Is a Person


Sometimes a young husband will refer to his unborn child as "it" sometimes. That's because, unlike his wife, he doesn't yet have a felt connection with his son or daughter. The connection just isn't quite there. will never again be an "it." The son or daughter is now a living, breathing reality. Things will never be the same again.

Isn't this how we often talk about the Holy Spirit? We're not comfortable or familiar enough with Him to refer to Him any other way than "it." The Scripture never makes this mistake. The Holy Spirit is always described in the Bible as a "He," not an "It." He is one of the three Members of the Triune God. While we worship one Lord, He is expressed as Father, Son and Holy Spirit. We are intimately connected to Him. And once we know Him, things will never be the same again.



#### A Tragic Disconnect

Most parents' anticipation of their child's first word is rewarded sometime around the son or daughter's first birthday. Before long, there are modewords and then fragments and then whole sentences. By the time bubbling paragraphs full of run-on sentences become commonplace, mom or dad might wish for a few moments of silence. Even so, parents love to hear their children's voices.



That's why autism is so heartbreaking. For the parents of an autistic child, the longing for communication can feel like a cheap trick. God made us with ears to listen to our children, yet these parents are cheated out of the prize. The usual interchange between a mother and son or a father and daughter, complete with silly words and laughter, is typically absent where autism is present in the home. Silence is often a tragic hallmark of the disease. Silence that can't be broken by ordinary means.

These days, parents and educators and medical professionals are working hard to raise our awareness about autism. Doctors are lobbying for earlier testing. Educators are launching schools and programs just for autistic kids. And parents—hurting, caring, creative parents—are doing everything in their power to make autism an easier verdict for families. Petting zoos, animal assistance programs, books and websites, all represent volunteerism at its best. It's the parents who are making the biggest difference. And why not? They are the ones who care the most.

#### Made to Connect

We all know prayer is communication with God. We study it, talk about it, read about it. But, if we're really honest, we would all admit how difficult prayer actually is. We make lists and set our clocks and study it some more, but still prayer doesn't come easily. We even get on our knees... and fall asleep. We say, "I'll pray for you," then forget to do it. What's wrong with us?

One of the tragic effects of sin is our inability to communicate with God. As Christians, we sense that our silence hurts our Father. This knowledge may even make prayer seem more daunting. The good news is, He's more compassionate than any father here on earth. Yes, He longs to hear us speak. But He also understands how hard it can be for us to utter the simplest of phrases to Him. Yes, He made us with a capacity for conversation. And His plan is to redeem and repair that basic instinct. Could it be we're treating prayer like a discipline rather than a God-given impulse? Prayer is much more than a discipline. It is the miracle God intended to break the silence between His heart and ours.

#### I. What Are the Essentials of Prayer?

God has broken the silence between us by speaking through His Word, by sending His Son. The Father has initiated the communication and prayer is our response. It's a miraculous connection. And, often, when we first begin the conversation, it seems to come naturally. So why all the emphasis on discipline? Why the plethora of "helps" for those who are serious about prayer?

Romance, in the beginning, has no requirements. Communication happens easily between those who are newly in love. In fact, for the couple who are smitten with each other, it's hard to imagine ever having to "work at" their relationship. But at some point, if the romance flourishes and leads to marriage, discipline becomes necessary. Not always, but sometimes. There are just too many distractions in every day life. Too many ways to lose sight of the main thing.

Sure, prayer involves discipline. But, at its heart, it is still an intimate conversation. And discipline is the tether that keeps the conversation going when all else fails.

Why, When, and How

Why should we pray, according to Hebrews 4:16? And with what attitude?

Praying without ceasing seems impossible, but it is similar to breathing and thinking at the same time.



What about unanswered prayer? Little children ask for many things their parents think it unwise to give them. Our heavenly Parent, God, knows much better then we do what our needs are, and when they should be met. Everyone has prayed in some urgent or desperate circumstance, and failed to receive what they asked for. We tend to call this "unanswered prayer," but it's more accurate to say that the answer isn't the one we preferred. God answers every prayer—the mature Christian seeks to draw closer to Him to better understand those answers.

#### II. WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF PRAYER?

#### Great Benefits

The benefits of good communication may best be understood by observing what happens in a relationship without it. When two people don't talk, they never get to know each other, they have no basis for resolving conflict, and they can't deepen the relationship. But when they do talk, the opposite is true, the union flourishes and grows. It's even possible to experience personal growth because of our interaction with others. We say things like, "I am a better person because of you," and it's true. But there's a limit to what communication can do. Unless the conversation is with God.

When we talk with God, we get to know Him better. Our relationship with Him thrives. But the benefits of prayer extend far beyond that. Unlike a human relationship, this is a union with the God of the Universe. It stands to reason that conversation with *Him* would impact our lives in incredible ways. Read on to discover just a taste of what His power can do when activated by our prayer.

#### Making a List and Checking It Twice

When you calendar is full of errands and appointments, you make a list. You can't afford to forget even one responsibility. After all, most of your obligations ultimately impact people. If you slack off in your business,



your family eventually suffers. The same with your bills. If you're late to a meeting, others are inconvenienced. So you write it down and follow through.

In the same way, your prayer life is a responsibility that impacts people. As you schedule a daily prayer time, have a prayer notebook with you in which you can jot down requests. It can serve as a handheld device that reminds you to pray. And you can also keep track of the answers to your prayers—that's the exciting part. Your prayer list might include some or all of the following:

- > Family members
- > Non-Christian acquaintances
- > Pastor and Church
- > People at work
- > Problem relationships
- > Governmental authorities
- > Missionaries and Christian workers
- > Personal needs

#### IV. How Do We Spend Time with God?

#### Quiet Time

Much has been written, suggested and outlined for believers to help them have a fruitful and effective quiet time. These quiet times have truly been daily spiritual food for many, yet many others have felt guilty or somehow inferior for their inconsistency or lack of focus. Our goal is not to burden you with a task, but to deepen your intimacy with God.


#### Why Have a Quiet Time?

David, in Psalm 27:8, says, "My heart says of you, 'Seek His face!' your face, LORD, I will seek." God called David to seek His face. God desires our presence—much like a father desires to be with his children. This is our motivation: to be with God. He wants us!

A quiet time is a meeting with our Lord—to hear from Him, to call out to Him, to be with Him. David expresses his heart to be with God in Psalm 27:4: "One thing I ask of the Lord, this is what I seek: that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of your life, to gaze upon the beauty (delightfulness) of the Lord and to seek Him in His temple." David wanted one thing of God—to be with God, to know and love God, to consider His ways. This was his heart's desire. It was a yearning, a thirst. It was his highest priority. The psalmist in Psalm 42:1 illustrates this: "As the deer pants for streams of water, so my soul pants for You, O God."

#### What Is a Quiet Time?

- > A special time to meditate and reflect on God's Word for inspiration, guidance, hope.
- > A time to hear from God. Jeremiah 33:3: "Call to Me and I will answer you and tell you great and unsearchable things you do not know."



- > A time to call upon God in prayer.
- > Pray Scripture back to God.

Adoration Confession Thanksgiving Supplication

Many Christians have found the letters ACTS helpful in praying. The letters stand for Adoration, Confession, Thanksgiving, and Supplication (requests). This is a sensible sequence; we get everything in perspective by adoring and praising God for who He is. Focusing on God reveals our own inadequacies and failures, and we confess them. As we do this, we know God forgives us, and as we feel a refreshing sense of thanksgiving, we begin to express our gratitude for His many blessings. Finally, with the Spirit's assistance, we can properly ask Him to supply our needs and the needs of others.

ACTS is NOT a list of "to dos." It is a guideline to help focus our prayers.

#### When?

Whenever you so desire! Many have found it beneficial to greet the Lord early in the morning, before they engage in daily activities. Many of the Psalms encourage this. Others have found that night time may be more suitable for them. Any time is good—the point is to do it. Yet, don't feel guilty if you miss this time. Consistency comes with growth, practice, and maturity.

#### How?

Ten to fifteen minutes may be a realistic goal to begin with. You may want to eventually lengthen this time. You might spend it in the following way:

- > Five minutes of prayer
- > Five minutes of Bible reading
- > Five minutes of reflection/meditation

Find a quiet place, free from distractions. You may want to be at a table, desk or favorite reading chair in order to be able to write and reflect.

#### Some Practical Suggestions to Get Started

You can read through the Psalms in a month by reading five psalms a day. You can also read through Proverbs in a month, one chapter a day. Several Bibles are available that are designed to help you read through the Bible in a year. This usually takes only 15-20 minutes a day of reading. *The Daily Walk Bible* published by Walk Thru the Bible Ministries is available in several translations and gives an overview of the day's reading, insight into some of the history and other background, and helps in applying Scripture to daily life.



#### The Allure of a Good Story

Just when we thought the television sitcom was a dying genre, along came a show about... nothing. Instead of telling the contrived tales of co-workers or family members, Jerry Seinfeld and Larry David concocted a program based on the shaky premise that millions of viewers just might find real life minutiae of four friends in the upper west side of Manhattan interesting. The sitcom focused its drama on riveting subjects like waiting in line at restaurants, going to the dentist, or finding a parking space. And it ran for nine successful seasons and won an unprecedented ten Emmy awards. All proof of the attraction of a story.



The setting and the characters may vary, but the *story* is what fascinates us. That's why we have an undeniable urge to tell our stories. Whether our alma mater just won the NCAA basketball championship or our puppy did a new trick. Whether we won an all-expense-paid cruise in the lottery or something funny happened at the grocery store. We want to tell about our day and we want to tell about our life. And the people who know us usually want to hear.

#### Spread the Word!

We all have a story. Some are glamorous, some very difficult, and some are plain vanilla. If we know Jesus Christ, we have a story of epic and eternal proportions. It doesn't matter whether we quietly turned to Christ as a young child or dramatically returned from a life of rebellion as an adult. The story is essentially the same—we were dead and now we are alive! How much more powerful could a story be?

#### The Big Picture

In this lesson, we'll discuss the art of sharing wonderful news. We'll discuss four categories:

- I. What is my testimony?
- II. Why should I tell others?
- III. What should I say?
- IV. Who should I tell?

### I. WHAT IS MY TESTIMONY (A REAL LIFE STORY)?

Putting Your Story to Work

"I wish I could turn this conversation around and tell him about Christ."

"If there were only more time, I could tell him what Christ means to me."

"I wish I could remember those verses about how someone can receive Christ."

"If Paul were here, he could really explain how to become a Christian."

Have these thoughts ever crossed your mind as you have had opportunities to share Christ? You can turn day-to-day situations into exciting opportunities to share your faith by preparing ahead of time. In I Peter 3:15, Peter admonished us to be ready:

"But in your hearts set apart Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have." *I Peter 3:15* 

Any subject can be presented more effectively by careful organization. A carefully prepared testimony, given in the power of the Holy Spirit, can be of immediate and effective use in nearly every witnessing situation. It should be our desire to present Christ in such a clear and attractive, yet simple, way that those who hear will not only want to know Him, but they will want to know Him in a personal way.

A carefully worded, concise testimony will communicate far more effectively than a

prolonged presentation that includes a lot of extraneous material. The key is to minimize details that detract from, rather than emphasize, the point of personal commitment to Christ and what this can mean in a person's life. What are the essentials for effectively presenting the gospel? Fortunately, God has left us a model to follow. In Acts 26, we find Paul before King Agrippa in the act of giving his testimony. Read Acts 26 before going on. Here are a few ways that you might personalize these same principles in your own testimony.

#### 1. Gracious Introduction

Acts 26:2, 3: "...I consider myself fortunate to stand before you today as I make my defense..."

Describe Paul's etiquette in verses 2 and 3.

Notice that Paul referred to Agrippa's knowledge of Jewish customs. In the same way, find a point of common interest or identification. You might say to a friend, "You and I have a lot in common, Pete.

When I started my career, I had everything a fellow could want, but underneath there was a lot of dissatisfaction." If the person has children, something along the following lines might be appropriate: "Bringing up children in this modern world is nearly impossible. Apart from one fact I'd be utterly lost." You should have several possible introductions that you could use in a variety of situations.



#### 2. Good Part of Past Life

Acts 26:4, 5: "...I lived as a Pharisee..."

What is Paul's strategy in these verses?

If you just say what a sinner you were, people won't identify themselves with you. Paul told how he was respected for his religious practices. If relevant, briefly mention your good points from a worldly sense, like morality, church attendance, ideas about God, generosity, as you lead to the third point.



#### 5. Results of Conversion

Acts 26:19: "I was not disobedient to the vision from heaven."

What were some of the results of Paul's encounter with Jesus?



Mention the most striking change in your life, as Paul did—whether in desires, actions, hunger for God's Word, peace, or satisfaction. Show the effects of your being born-again. Be realistic. Don't imply that Christ eliminates all the problems of life, but rather that He enables you to live them out with peace and confidence.


#### 6. Gospel Message

Acts 26:23: "that the Christ would suffer and, as the first to rise from the dead..."

Why is it important that Paul included this in his story?		


Christ's story, His death for our sins and His resurrection, must be interwoven into your story. Without His resurrection you would not have a story worth telling. Emphasize that the difference in your life was accepting Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior.

The order of Paul's story reflects the situation he was in and the people he was speaking to. Your message must have this type of flexibility. For example, you may find it beneficial to include the gospel explanation in point four, making it part of the explanation of how you came to Christ. This portion of your testimony should include verses of Scripture.

## Helpful Hints for Writing Out Your Testimony

- 1. "Speak to God first, and ask Him to speak through you. Ask Him to give you wisdom and guidance as you write." *James1:5*, 6
- 2. Follow a three-point outline:
  - a. Life before knowing Christ.
  - b. How you came to Christ (be specific).
  - c. Life after you received Christ (changes He has made, what He means to you now).
- 3. Begin with an interesting, attention-getting sentence and close with a good conclusion. Include relevant, thought-provoking, personal experiences.
- 4. Write in such a way that others will identify with your past and present experiences.
- 5. Give enough detail to arouse interest.
- 6. Use some Scripture verses.
- 7. Avoid
  - a. using statements which reflect negatively on people or organizations.
  - b. mentioning denominations.
  - c. preaching at people. This is a testimony, not a "preachamony."
  - d. using stereotypes or overworked terms.
  - e. using words that are meaningless to non-Christians, e.g. "salvation," "saved," "born-again," sanctified," etc. If this type of word must be used, it should be clearly explained.
- 8. Prepare your testimony so that you can share it in a group situation as well as with an individual.
- 9. Build your testimony around a theme—something characteristic of your life that is of general interest to non-Christians. Examples: personal success (your past vs. present perspective), life goals, etc.
- 10. Keep in mind that your testimony should give details so that someone else would know how to trust Christ.
- 11. "It is important that Christ be lifted up as the only way to eternal life." (John 14:6). Make sure this point is clearly made in your testimony.
- 12. When you have finished writing your testimony, look in the back of this book and tear out the "Ten Most Wanted" card. List one or two people with whom you would eventually like to share your testimony.

Begin praying regularly for those you have listed, that God would:

- a. Prepare their hearts;
- b. Give you sensitivity to them;
- c. Provide an opportunity to share.

## II. WHY SHOULD I TELL OTHERS?

## Ask and Listen before Telling

In having a desire to share your faith with others it is very important to get to know the others. When you meet with someone, show genuine care by asking questions about them, get to know their heart before sharing your story. Listening intently communicates love. This helps you find areas of common ground and opens up receptivity. Otherwise it will feel like you're dumping your truckload on them.

But there's another element to your presentation: just as you share His story, you must also share your own real life story. It's called your testimony.


## IV. Who Should I Tell?

## Three Levels of Sharing Our Faith

- 1. Raising the Flag
- 2. Faith Stories
- 3. Testimony

It's important to be sensitive to the moment in sharing Christ with an unbeliever. The Holy Spirit will prod you at the right time and give you the words. But what you say, and how much you share, is affected by such factors as how well and how long you've known your friend, and what your surroundings are at the time. There are times when a hard-hitting, involved testimony can be self-defeating. We will briefly describe raising the flag and faith stories as ways to open doors to share your faith.

## 1. Raising the Flag:

A flag clearly communicates the allegiance of the one raising it. In casual conversation, it can be easy—and non-threatening—to raise the flag of your faith by mentioning that a prayer has been answered, or that God has been dealing with you recently on an issue. It's also easy to make a reference to a good illustration from the pastor's sermon. These gentle "flags" establish your status as a Christian.

Raising the Flag Principles:

- > It should happen as a natural part of a conversation.
- > If it takes more than thirty seconds, you're probably saying too much.
- > Its purpose is to establish your identity as a member of God's family, not as a member of a religious denomination or affiliation.

#### 2. Faith Stories:

A faith story is a more direct way to talk about the presence of God in your life. While less than a full testimony, it's instead an anecdote about God's love and grace in one specific instance in your life—how He got you through a difficult time, how His blessing came at just the right time. A good, polished faith story will always command attention and open doors.

Faith Story Principles:


- > A short story of when a Biblical truth made an impact on your life.
- > Its purpose is to create hunger in the unbeliever.

#### Examples:

- > Learning something new about business from the Bible.
- > Making a decision about work, family or relationships based on the Bible.

### 3. Testimony:

Paul had many months in prison to prepare his testimony before King Agrippa (Acts 26). The result was a sharp, brief life testimony no one could deny or attack. You'll need to spend some time polishing the story of your conversion. It's one of your most precious tools, so tell it to others.
